In Support of Education

Aside from providing the necessities of nutritious food and safe shelter, Boulware Mission goes above and beyond by making learning available to her residents.

Beginning with the most fundamental of training opportunities, Case Managers work with their clients to see that they receive the education that they need to better themselves.

First and foremost, anyone who comes to the Mission without a High School Diploma is encouraged to attend GED tutoring, which is offered on-site.

Miss Kathy Williams, a retired school teacher, has been volunteering her services to Boul-

ware and other non-profit organizations for more than 7 years. Miss Williams has tutored countless individuals and has graduated 25 students during their stay at the Mission; many others have gone on to graduate after leaving.

Since July of this year, 21 residents have taken advantage of GED tutoring. Earlier this month, residents and staff recognized Boulware's newest GED graduate, Teri Rexing.

In addition to GED tutoring, residents are encouraged to seek out higher education. Each semester, Boulware has residents enroll in local college classes. Staff are there to

encourage them and assist in the enrollment process.

In addition to traditional education, residents are provided with several learning programs aimed at giving them the tools they need to improve their lives.


Financial Literacy classes are taught to provide residents with the knowledge to make sound financial decisions,

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including deciphering between wants and needs, working with a banking institution, and living within a budget. One-on-one sessions are also available for individual financial counseling.

Sale of Hall Street Property

731 Hall Street has become a landmark property in the Owensboro community as the original location of the Boulware Mission. Her walls have sheltered thousands of homeless and needy individuals over the years as many have called the building home.

In February of last year, in an effort to streamline expenses and programing, Boulware's staff and residents moved out of the building and into the Mission's Wing Avenue property.

It has proven to be the right move for the Mission as the Wing Avenue property offers ample space for everything the Mission offers and even has room to grow.

After the move, the Hall Street building did not sit vacant as Lighthouse Recovery Services expressed interest in renting the facility. After a year of renting, Lighthouse has entered into a contract to purchase the property.

Please see the following letter from Boulware's Board President concerning the sale:

The sale of Boulware Mission's Hall Street building to Lighthouse Recovery Services was announced November 10th, 2012. All of the Mission's operations and clients were consolidated to Wing Avenue in February 2011.

The consolidation has gone well and met all expectations. Lighthouse Recovery began renting the Hall Street building in the spring of 2011 and it has been at capacity of 35 since.

Boulware Mission's board of directors determined in strategic planning exercises this year the best utilization of the Mission's resources would be achieved by focusing on the Wing Avenue campus. If Hall Street were to be sold, the board also preferred the purchaser provide services to those in need. The dialog with Lighthouse Recovery began in July of this year.

Following the expansion at Wing Avenue made possible with the Impact 100 grant

award in 2011, approximately 30% of the available space or over 7,500 square feet remain without electricity and heating. Our long range goals are to increase our client capacity up to the level of 90 now authorized from the current capacity of 78 and to renovate the entire complex.

Boulware Mission's roots began at Hall Street and we are profusely proud of the legacy and the memories. Boulware Mission is much more than a building.

We are dedicated to serving our clients in their recovery process. This move allows us to more effectively utilize the resources you have entrusted to us in that effort.

Impact 100 Renovation

Education Continued

Another popular educational program is the Job Skills class. This class teaches residents how to search for a job, fill out an application, interview, and retain a job. All Boulware residents take this course prior to beginning job search.

Nutrition and healthy living sessions are offered, teaching residents nutritious eating, food preparation, exercise, and meditation. Many homeless individuals have detrimental diets and come from unsanitary living conditions when they arrive at the Mission. This program shows

clients a new way of living that they will take with them when they leave.

Last but not least, Boulware offers both a licensed drug and alcohol treatment program and continuing education for residents who suffer from addiction. This part of our program is essential to starting a new life in recovery.
